



COMPANY SENTENCED FOR SERIOUS WORKPLACE INJURY

A sand and gravel supplier has been penalized \$150,000 related to a serious workplace injury incident. McLeod Valley Sand and Gravel, as an employer, pleaded guilty on Aug. 25 in the Evansburg Court of Justice to one count under the Occupational Health and Safety (OHS) Act for failing to ensure the health and safety of a worker. The Crown withdrew 14 other counts. The Crown withdrew all 17 counts against JRF Oilfield Services Ltd. related to the same incident


The charges stem from an incident that occurred on a construction site near Entwistle on June 29, 2023. A worker became entangled in a roller that formed part of a conveyer's drive system and suffered serious injuries.

On Oct. 20, under a creative sentence, the court ordered McLeod Valley Sand and Gravel to pay \$150,000 to the Alberta Sand and Gravel Association to develop three interactive online safety training modules.

The OHS Act provides a creative sentence option in which funds that would otherwise be paid as fines are directed to an organization or project to improve or promote workplace health and safety.

Both the company and the Crown have up to 30 days to appeal the conviction or penalties.

Alberta's OHS laws set basic health and safety rules for workplaces across the province. They provide guidance for employers to help them ensure their workplaces are as healthy and safe as possible while providing rights and protections for workers. Charges under OHS laws may be laid when failing to follow the rules results in a fatality or serious injury.

CUTTING WAIT TIMES FOR WATER

Alberta's government has cut wait times for Water Act licences nearly in half over the last year, saving Albertans time and money.

By cutting red tape, setting standards and streamlining processes, Alberta's government has reduced wait times for Water Act licences by 52 per cent in the last year. This makes it easier for landowners, businesses and municipalities to get the water they need to support growing communities and a thriving economy.

"We are getting government out of the way so that farmers, ranchers, communities and businesses can keep on growing. Routine water applications shouldn't take months or even years. I'm proud of the work we've done over the past two years to show we can maintain Alberta's world class environmental standards without holding up good projects or keeping Albertans from getting the water they need."

Alberta's government introduced mandatory service targets for all Water Act applications last year to speed up reviews and stop unnecessary delays. A new online system is also in place that makes it quicker and easier to submit and review applications, and regulatory improvements like eliminating unnecessary 10 per cent holdbacks on most water transfers have reduced unnecessary paperwork.

"These results are good news for every Albertan, company or community looking to access water in this province. Minister Schulz and I will keep looking for ways to cut red tape, reduce bureaucratic delays and get rid of outdated processes that slow good work down."

Thanks to these improvements, wait times for licences have fallen 52 per cent in the last year and 79 per cent since 2021. The 79 per cent improvement means the applicant is receiving a decision 354 days sooner, on average.

"We're tossing out the long delays for regulatory approvals and decisions that hold businesses and communities back. Our government continues to cut red tape, knocking down bureaucratic barriers so Alberta continues to be the best place in Canada to live, work and do business."

This is all part of the government's work to make common-sense changes that modernize Alberta's water management system and make more water available for farmers, ranchers, businesses and growing communities.

"The County of Grande Prairie has experienced a significant reduction in wait times for Water Act applications, thanks to the Government of Alberta's Digital Regulatory Assurance System and streamlined application process. Prior to this, applications could take six months or more to be approved, depending on project complexity. Now, both small- and large-scale projects are being processed and approved in just one to two months. This system has increased efficiency and clarified requirements, saving administrative time and resources."

el industry has struggled with permitting delays, which hampers both investment and development. These delays result in wasted money, time and effort, and lead to higher project costs and slower completion times for housing and critical infrastructure. 
Details: Division Administrative Reports

FASTER ACCESS TO PREVENTATIVE CARE

Submitted by Government of Alberta

New reforms will expand access and choice for preventative screening, elective testing and other diagnostic services to deliver faster, more effective care.

Enhancing access is the clear path to achieving better health outcomes and patient autonomy for Albertans, and reducing health care system strain. New legislative reforms will allow Albertans to privately purchase any diagnostic screening and testing services they wish, including MRIs, CT scans, full-body scans and blood work.

These reforms will also allow health professionals and medical organizations to offer these services privately and enable supplemental health benefits plans to insure them. Preventative care can identify developing heath conditions early. Currently, long diagnostic imaging wait times and growing waitlists for preventative screening are delaying timely care for Albertans.

Under Alberta's Public Health Guarantee, all physician-recommended tests will continue to be fully covered and prioritized in all facilities, public or private, across the province. If a privately purchased test reveals a significant or critical condition, the out-of-pocket cost will be reimbursed, ensuring no Albertan pays for a medically necessary test.

Expanded access to elective testing, screening and other diagnostic services will attract new investment in diagnostic technology and facilities. This approach will increase capacity, shorten wait times and reduce pressure on Alberta's public health system.

"Albertans deserve timely answers about their health. By expanding access to preventative and elective testing, we're empowering people to take control of their care and reducing wait times across the system."

Improving access to preventative screening will support Albertans in getting the care they need in the early stages of a health condition. In fact, the greatest improvement for cancer and heart disease survival rates is early detection. For example:

- When lung cancer is caught early, the survival rate is more than 60 per cent; if caught late, it is only 24 per cent.
- For stomach cancer, survival rates reach 70 per cent if caught early, compared to 32 per cent if

caught late.

• For breast cancer, survival rates are now more than 93 per cent if caught early.

It is also far less costly and less invasive to treat these conditions in their early stages, as opposed to when they have reached an advanced stage.

""While there is no cure for Alzheimer's disease or dementia, early detection helps people begin treatments and lifestyle supports that improve quality of life. It also gives individuals and families time to talk openly about wishes and future plans while the person living with dementia can fully participate."

Alberta's government will be conducting engagement with stakeholders on the proposed changes. This work will help inform what legislative and policy changes might be needed to allow for increased access to preventative screening options. Further details will be shared in the coming months.

Auto TUNE-UP

HOW TO HANDLE CAR TROUBLE WHILE DRIVING

Sudden car trouble is something no driver wants to experience, but many a driver has been driving down the highway only to feel his or her vehicle start to sputter. Such sputtering might indicate a car is running low on fuel, or it could be a sign of something more serious that requires motorists to think as quickly and safely as possible.

When car trouble strikes while a vehicle is on the road, the first thing many drivers do is check their fuel gauges. A car that runs out of gas is certain-

ly inconvenient, but if you can pull over to the shoulder or make it to the nearest filling station, then this unfortunate situation can be remedied rather easily. But when a car's tank is full and it is still showing signs of trouble, drivers must take steps to protect themselves, their passengers and their vehicles. The following are a few simple tips motorists should keep in mind so they can safely handle any car trouble that may arise while they are out on the road.


Keep a first-aid

kit, spare tire and tire jack in the car at all times. Flat tires are no fun, but they are even more of a nuisance when drivers are not prepared to address them. Always keep a jack and spare tire in your car, even if the spare is a donut you can temporarily use to replace a flat tire until you make it to a filling station or automotive supply store. As an added safety measure, keep a fully stocked first aid kit in your vehicle in case you cut yourself while changing the tire or need to address another medical situation. Visit www. redcross.org for a list of items to include in your automotive emergency kit. Keep a blanket in the trunk as well so your passengers can stay warm should you experience car trouble on a cold day or night.

• Make note of your surroundings. Some car troubles can only be fixed by the professionals, so pay careful attention to your surroundings in case an issue arises and forces you to pull over and call for help. Always pay

attention to mile markers and any landmarks that might help you describe where you are. Car troubles can strike at any time and anywhere, so be sure to pay special attention to your surroundings when driving in unfamiliar areas.

Pull over. Don't panic if an issue arises suddenly. Remain calm and pull over onto the shoulder. The right shoulder is the area for pulling over on most roads, but you may also use the left shoulder on multilane highways with

medians. Try to get as far away from traffic as possible without driving off of level ground, and always use your signals when pulling onto the shoulder. If the vehicle can't make it to the median, put your emergency flashers on and get out of the car, moving away from both the vehicle and traffic. Immediately call for emergency roadside assistance, alerting the authorities if need be.

Use flares or triangles to alert other drivers. So long as you are not risking your well-being, you can place flares and/or warning triangles behind your vehicle so oncoming traffic knows to drive around it. The not-for-profpopular it motor club AAA recommends placing the first flare or triangle 10 feet directly behind the side of the vehicle that is closest to the road. The second should be placed between 30 and 60 feet (increase the distances as the posted speed limit increases) behind the middle of the bumper, while the third flare or triangle should be placed between 120

and 360 feet behind the vehicle's right side.

- Stay with the vehicle. Once you have called for help and set up flares or triangles, stay with the vehicle, though do so at a safe enough distance so you are not in harm's way.
- Sudden car troubles can be scary, but drivers who approach such issues calmly and quickly can reduce their risk for accident or inju-

HELP FOR FAMILIES: PARENT PAYMENTS BEGIN

Submitted by Government of Alberta

Eligible families who applied for support through the Parent Payment Program on or before Oct. 27 will receive their full payment starting Oct. 31.

To help cover extra costs families faced while schools were closed. Alberta's government introduced the Parent Payment Program. This non-taxable support is for families with children aged 12 and under that attend a public, Catholic or francophone school affected by the strike. Families with children aged 17 and under who have active Family Support for Children with Disabilities (FSCD) agreements also qualify for additional support.

Parents and guardians who applied for the program on or before Oct. 27 will start to receive their payments by e-transfer on Oct. 31. These payments provide \$30 per child per school day for the length of the Oct. 6-28 teacher strike. Eligible families with active FSCD agreements will receive \$60 per child for the same dates.

For families that applied to the program after Oct. 28, another batch of payments will start going out on Nov. 30. The Parent Payment Program portal remains open, and families can

apply until Nov. 14.

Receiving your parent payments

To protect yourself from scams impersonating the Government of Alberta, do not accept an e-transfer if you did not apply for a payment through the Parent Payment Program portal.

All parent payments will be sent by e-transfer using the email address associated with your Alberta.ca account. If you have auto-deposit, the payment will be automatically deposited. If you do not have auto-deposit set up, you will have 10 days to manually accept your payment. If the e-transfer is not accepted within 10 days, it will be cancelled and reissued on Nov. 30.

If you applied before Oct. 27 and do not receive an e-transfer by Nov. 3, check your spam folder or log in to your Alberta.ca account to confirm the status of your payment. An application confirmation number will be needed to manually accept your e-transfer. If you do not remember this number, please check the application confirmation page in your Alberta.ca account.

The security question password can be found on an individual's Your-Alberta Parent Payment Program application under application summary.

The Application Refer-

ence Number will be in the form of XXXX-XXXX and must be entered as shown, including dashes, and is case sensitive. Do not copy and paste.

Parents who are entitled to additional funding but have not yet received it will be included in a future payment run.

Eligibility

To be eligible for the Parent Payment Program, the following criteria must be met:

- You must be the parent/guardian of a child aged 12 or under.
- Your child must be enrolled in a public, Catholic or francophone school impacted by the teacher strike.
- You and your child must be Alberta residents.

To be eligible for the additional support available to families of children with complex care needs, the following additional criteria must be met:

• You must be the parent/guardian of a child aged 17 or under with an active FSCD agreement.

Parent applications will be reviewed and validated to ensure eligibility criteria are met. Only one parent/guardian per child is eligible for the Parent Payment Program. The parent/guardian who applies must have the same mailing address that is in the child's student profile.

How to apply

Applications are still open and will be accepted until Nov. 14.

- Step 1: Log into your verified Alberta.ca Account
- o Sign up for an Alberta.ca account if you do not already have one.
- Step 2. Apply on Parent Payment Program.

To apply, the addresses on your alberta.ca account and on your child's student file must match exactly. Any difference in street name or numbers, abbreviations, postal code, etc. will result in an error message. Please confirm the addresses on file match.

- If you need to update your child's student file, please contact your school or school board.
- You can update the address associated with your Alberta. ca account by visiting a registry office (this address must match what appears on your driver's license or Alberta ID).

BUILDING A SAFER ALBERTA

Submitted by Government of Alberta

Alberta's government is introducing legislation to make communities safer, strengthen policing and modernize laws that protect Albertans.

If passed, Bill 4, the Public

Safety and Emergency Services Statutes Amendment Act, 2025 (No. 2) will bring together several focused legislative changes that support stronger policing and more effective correctional and domestic violence prevention systems. This includes advancing the next step of establishing the Alberta Sheriffs Police Service, enhancing the Disclosure to Protect Against Domestic Violence (Clare's Law) Act to help protect people at risk of domestic violence, and modernizing the Corrections Act to improve efficiency and coordination in Alberta's correctional system.

"This legislation strengthens the laws that keep Albertans safe. It builds a strong foundation for the new Alberta Sheriffs Police Service, ensures people at risk of domestic violence can quickly get the information they need to protect themselves and modernizes how our correctional

system operates. Together, these changes reflect our government's commitment to practical, common-sense improvements that make Alberta's communities safer."

Alberta Sheriffs Police Service Following the creation of the Alberta Sheriffs Police Service (ASPS) in July 2025, work is well underway to establish the service's organizational capacity and operational standards, ensuring it is ready to provide municipalities with another effective choice for meeting their local law enforcement needs.

If passed, the proposed legislation would build on this progress by putting in place the labour relations framework needed to support operations and recruitment, while also ensuring ASPS officers have the same collective bargaining rights and labour relations rules as other police services. This includes the ability to form a police association and bargain collectively.

Once fully operational, the ASPS will strengthen Alberta's existing policing model and complement the province's current police services, which include the RCMP, First Nations police services and municipal police. The ASPS will help fill gaps, reduce response times and ensure law enforcement resources are deployed efficiently to meet Alberta's public safety needs.

"The Alberta Sheriffs Police Service is being built to strengthen public safety across Alberta. This legislation marks another important step in creating a modern, accountable police service that Albertans and communities can rely on. Establishing a clear and consistent labour framework helps ensure future officers are supported, our recruitment is strong and the service is ready to deliver for Albertans and municipalities."

The legislation also strengthens the Disclosure to Protect Against Domestic Violence (Clare's Law) Act with amendments to clearly define the role and legal authority of the Integrated Threat and Risk Assessment Centre (ITRAC) to access police databases when preparing threat assessments.

These amendments would cut red tape, reduce delays and make it easier for police and partners to share information, ensuring Albertans at risk of domestic violence can quickly access the facts they need to stay safe.

I commend Alberta's government for strengthening Clare's Law to remove bureaucratic obstacles and clarify ITRAC's access to vital police information. JANUARY PROVINCIAL EXAM UPDATE

cial Achievement Tests (PATs).


The cancellation will not affect students' ability to apply to, be accepted by, or attend post-secondary institutions.

Students who choose not to write at a later date will receive their school-awarded mark as their final official course mark. A notation will be added to transcripts confirming that no diploma exam was written. This ensures there is no impact on students' ability

to graduate or transition into post-secondary programs.

School authorities will meet all learning outcomes for the school year and will have flexibility to adjust the school calendar as needed. Any changes in the school calendar will be communicated to families by their school.




