

#### THE GOOD LORD HATES A COWARD

Recently I was asked to speak at a couple little town hall events in Edmonton held by some constituency associations. It's always an honour to be asked to speak from folks from other parts of the province for me. Now imagine my surprise when I was approached by a few staff members, that were concerned for my safety due to some "Online Comments and threats" made about me. Threatening that they would "Get Me...".

The temperature out there right now is a little testy, folks are strained, under pressures, but the fever-pitched mob "Chicken Dancing Elbows Up, How Dare" you crowd is a little unhinged. You see, the predictions that they made, the rhetoric we've put up with politely for a number of years has run its course, and heaven forbid us "old elected" guys speak up in public. Wow. Some suggested I should cancel.

I did the event; I was told once by a grizzled old Civil Superintendent that "The Good Lord Hates a Coward". The threats this time were just that, but a person always has to be cautious when dealing with the public, as many have shown during the recent strike are themselves unpredictable.

Now the same group is going to try and cancel the business that had allowed the local constituency association to host the event. This is wildly inappropriate, the gent that owns the place has an amazing group of people that work for him, and he may not happen to share the opinions or beliefs of the Keyboard Warriors of the present.

The staff at the venue are hardworking, positive, ambitious, and dare I say highly competent. It's not by chance, this is a sign of a great corporate culture, and I can tell you for sure I'll be back at the "B-Street Bar", and that neither the owner nor the staff deserve to be "Canceled" by allowing a local group to host the MLA from God's country to engage with the public, it's kind of our job. I don't think that the door swings both ways in their thoughts, they would be outraged if the Birkenstock was on the other foot as it were, we simply need to do better, and keep engaging, keep having open debate.

The recent speech from the throne rightfully addressed the importance of good relations with our USA trading partners, friends, and allies. I can tell you full well, for the last few years as the Parliamentary Secretary to the Premier, we have been on a full-court press in all the organizations that we

are members of that include the United States. These relationships that we have established have paid dividends, and continue to break ground, as well as bring validity to our positions. We have taken a collaborative approach, utilized the nonpartisan organizations to take leadership positions along with our friends in Saskatchewan and the NWT. In short, doors and more importantly phone calls are available when we need them because of this work.

In recent days, the Ontario campaign, although receiving lots of impressions on social media, had to be walked back by the new PM and the Premier of Ontario. I was in Washington DC for a capital visit, to meet with Senators, Congressmen, Representatives, and staffers regarding the interest of the Pacific Northwest Economic Region, and of course for our province. The lay of the land down there regardless of the party lines was positive, however, it was also tenuous as they were in their longest shutdown in recent memory. A few meetings we had set up were postponed as the President had recalled his members for a high-priority meeting. Not the right time to drop a "Finger Shaker" of an ad campaign regarding USA policy on

When the Elephants are Dancing, get off the floor, and for goodness' sake, don't throw peanuts, or kick them in the shins.

Our throne speech was timely, and I was able to send the link for the press release, as well as the link to the video to the person, from the USA, and both sides of the aisle thanked me, and stated it was "Very Much Appreciated on the Hill" and that they would share the message.

I'll also let you know that when I was traveling over the summer, I had a number of acts of kindness expressed to me to "help me on my way" while I was making my way on the plane to a few conferences that I was speaking at. Sometimes it's the little things that matter the most, an act of kindness from a stranger speaks volumes to the character of the region and gives an indication about how they feel about the place you call home.

At two separate airports I was provided with courtesy cars, no parking fees, heck, one place even put me up for the night in a boardroom / pilots lounge because the local hotel situation was a bit pricey, and short to come by. I had other local pilots offer hangar space for free, one manager even offered a place to stay in his own home.

This didn't just happen in one state, but several, literally, from

Montana, Idaho, and Washington state on one trip. Wyoming, Colorado, Texas, South Dakota, and back again to another part of Montana on another. One former Senator in Montana insisted I stay at his farm on my way back home, he was a fellow pilot, and I've got to know him pretty well over the last 5 years. When we drove up to his farmyard he had a big flagpole, and on top of it was not the star-spangled banner, but he was flying the Alberta Flag that I had given him a few years back as a sign of friendship. That act of kindness is something that is hard to put into words. Don't let the CBC, CNN, or XYZ media outlets fool you, we have some very close friends who respect us in the USA.

When in Alaska at the 50th AGM of the Energy Council I spent time with the group's outgoing and incoming presidents over the three days. They requested that I speak at the next conference regarding pipelines. A senator from Alabama was asking the panel members at one session about the interest in renewing the Keystone XL project. The Deputy Assistant Secretary of the Office of the Interior for the USA said they were absolutely interested in all pipelines and an all-of-the-above energy solution. Our federal representative from the federal government out of Seattle gave a lukewarm response at best. Ironically, 2 months later it was a different tune being sung by our new PM. Our USA friends look to us in Alberta for consistency, knowing full well we see the big

In Bellevue, Washington I had a chance to hear the USA ambassador to Canada speak. Although someone from BC decided to take a 30-second clip and made news in the CBC at home how "He said we were being Nasty" when it came to negotiations on liquor. It was out of context.

What they did miss out of the 30 min speech, was how he had restated the importance of our trade, our friendship, and that their hope was that cooler heads prevailed, dropped the noise, and made sure we are at the table on both sides, in good faith to make a deal. A bump in the road, for friends and allies who have come so far, and will go even further together. I'm paraphrasing, obviously. When he noted that the USA does not get a discount on energy...I kind of moaned a bit in disagreement, and he heard as I was in basically the front row. It was loud enough he had to comment, "Well my friends from Alberta may not agree, but these are my speaking points and

I'll stick to them."

Later that evening the Ambassador joined an event we were hosting, we spent half an hour just shooting the breeze, he's a good guy, wants the best for his country, and respects our province, and our positions. I gave him an Alberta belt buckle, and he one of my ball caps to wear as well.

Å month later I received a note from him, thanking me for the gifts, but more importantly, our conversation of building out our corner of North America. You see, diplomacy is less complicated than some folks make it. Talk to people, not about them in the media. Be direct and truthful, that can be respected, you are welcome to have a different position, but also be willing to listen. Do unto others as the saying goes, and make sure you are respectful, but don't be a pushover either

Similarly, when I was asked to speak in Lubbock, Texas at the Ports to Plains AGM, I was given the honour of being the second in the lineup, and they gave me an hour. I spoke on border challenges, trade relations, our economic corridor model, our complementary industries, but also the Alamo. I spoke about how our cultures in the western provinces, and the whole swath from Texas through the Midwest were aligned, and that just like the days of the Alamo, we know we could call on our friends to help if we were ever in a real fix, and they could rely on us as well.

The Congressman for the area thanked his friend, the "Snow Cowboy" for taking the time to come to "God's Country", west Texas, to not only talk about what matters in the north, but how we are in alignment with the needs of the USA. He acknowledged how Alberta really is the answer to many of the challenges facing them right now, how we need to make sure we build on the relationships we have, and to ensure our trade corridors align for years to come.

The Good Lord hates a coward,

and if we are not bold enough to speak up, or to do the tough things for the easy path, it is never a good thing. If we don't take the time to listen to others, to consider ideas, to improve, we fall short. Equally, if we sit and wring our hands, and never make a decision, we end up on the menu rather than at the ta-

ble. Let's continue to do the best we can, and perhaps, understand that most people are just doing the same, and don't let the "How Dare you, Elbows Uppers" divide us. November 26, 2025 Community VOICE Page 11






