
these officers were joined by City of Leduc Community Peace Officers, and Community Outreach Partners with the City of Leduc Navigators. In total 30 team members participated in the operation.

### STOPPING FAMILY VIOLENCE BEFORE IT STARTS

Alberta's government is supporting 31 community-based projects to prevent family violence across the province.

Family violence has devastating impacts and Alberta's government is committed to investing in strategies to promote healthy relationships and support individuals who have experienced family violence. That's why Alberta's government is investing \$4 million this year in 29 agencies offering 31 projects focused on addressing the root causes of family violence.



### KEEPING HOMES BRIGHT AND WARM ALL WINTER LONG

Alberta's Winter Rules for utilities are keeping the lights and heat on for Albertans during cold winter months.

From Oct. 15 until April 15, Alberta's Winter Rules for utilities are in effect, ensuring that residential electricity services cannot be fully disconnected by retailers, and starting Nov. 15, natural gas services cannot be fully disconnected either.

As winter weather hits and temperatures drop, these rules protect vulnerable Albertans from having critical utility services cut off. This ensures people across the province are able to access the reliable energy they need to provide for their families, when it's needed the most.

"No one should be forced to choose between keeping their homes warm or putting food on the table. During our harsh winters, utilities are not an option – they're vital to the survival of Albertans and we're taking action to make sure their heat and power stay on."

Nathan Neudorf, Minister of Affordability and Utilities Regardless of the time of year, disconnection of utilities is prohibited if the forecast predicts sub-zero temperatures within 24 hours of a planned disconnection.

Beginning Nov. 1, customers with disconnected utilities will be contacted by the Utilities Consumer Advocate (UCA) to help them reconnect before winter. The UCA partners with the Alberta Utilities Commission, utility retailers and distributors and other government agencies – such as Alberta Works and AISH – to help with reconnection.

"Many of the families and youth we support face tough choices during the winter months. These rules help ensure safety while giving organizations like Trellis time to provide support, helping Albertans stay housed, connected and hopeful for the future."

# FILING AN INDIAN BOARDING HOMES CLAIM IF YOU FILED A CLAIM IN ANOTHER SETTLEMENT

If you filed a claim in another settlement related to federal education programs, you may still be eligible to apply for the Indian Boarding Homes Class Action Settlement. These are separate legal processes, and receiving compensation under one does not automatically disqualify you from applying for the Indian Boarding Homes Settlement.

The Indian Boarding Homes Program recognizes the unique experiences of First Nations. Métis and Inuit children who were placed in private homes between September 1.1951 and June 30, 1992 for the purpose of attending school. Survivors of this program faced isolation, loss of culture and language, and risks of mistreatment while living away from their families and communities.

A Different Process, Focused on Survivors

Unlike past legal settlements, survivors applying to the Indian Boarding Homes Class Action are not required to testify or recount their story in order to receive compensation. The process is confidential and designed to acknowledge harms without forcing people to relive traumatic experiences.

Eligibility Requirements

You may qualify for the Indian Boarding Homes Settlement if you:

- Are First Nations, Métis or Inuit
- Were placed in a private home by the federal government to attend elementary or high school
- Lived in that home between September 1, 1951 and June 30, 1992

If you received compensation from the Residential Schools Settlement or any other settlement, you could still receive compensation from the Indian Boarding Homes Settlement, if you meet

all the eligibility requirements.

Filing a Claim for Compensation

The claims process for the Indian Boarding Homes Class Action Settlement is now open, with a deadline of February 22, 2027. Survivors can submit claims for compensation through a process that is designed to be clear, confidential, and accessible.

Support is available through Community Engagement Teams, who host Information Sessions across Canada to answer questions, provide resources, and guide survivors through how to file a claim.

You can also find detailed information and claim forms online.

Support and Resources for Survivors

Survivors and families do not need to navigate this process alone. Resources for emotional, cultural, and practical support are available to help you take the next step if you choose

### COMPANY SENTENCED FOR SERIOUS WORKPLACE INJURY

A sand and gravel supplier has been penalized \$150,000 related to a serious workplace injury incident.

McLeod Valley Sand and Gravel, as an employer, pleaded guilty on Aug. 25 in the Evansburg Court of Justice to one count under the Occupational Health and Safety (OHS) Act for failing to ensure the health and safety of a worker. The Crown withdrew 14 other counts. The Crown withdrew all 17 counts against JRF Oilfield Services Ltd. related to the same incident.

The charges stem from an incident that occurred on a construction site near Entwistle on June 29, 2023. A worker became entangled in a roller that formed part of a conveyer's drive system and suffered serious injuries.

On Oct. 20, under a creative sentence, the court ordered

McLeod Valley Sand and Gravel to pay \$150,000 to the Alberta Sand and Gravel Association to develop three interactive online safety training modules.

The OHS Act provides a creative sentence option in which funds that would otherwise be paid as fines are directed to an organization or project to improve or promote workplace health and safety.

Both the company and the Crown have up to 30 days to appeal the conviction or pen-

alties.

Alberta's OHS laws set basic health and safety rules for workplaces across the province. They provide guidance for employers to help them ensure their workplaces are as healthy and safe as possible while providing rights and protections for workers. Charges under OHS laws may be laid when failing to follow the rules results in a fatality or serious injury.

### ALBERTA RCMP CONCLUDE INVESTIGATION INTO SUDDEN DEATH DURING MMA FIGHT

On Nov. 23, 2024, Enoch RCMP received a report of the death of a 33-year-old fighter during a Mixed Mar-

tial Arts Event on Enoch Cree Nation. The investigation was assumed by the Alberta RCMP Major Crimes Unit who has been working collaboratively with the Edmonton Chief Medical Examiners Office to determine as cause of death and ascertain if there was any criminality.

The manner of death has been deemed as non-suspicious and RCMP have concluded their investigation.


