ADJUSTED RATE CAP: A GOOD DEAL FOR GOOD DRIVERS

Submitted by Government of Alberta

Albertans will continue to be protected by a new adjusted five per cent rate cap when the Care-First auto insurance system launches in 2027.

Alberta's government is introducing a new adjusted rate cap alongside the province's new Care-First auto insurance system, coming into effect on Jan. 1, 2027.

Albertans have faced rising costs when buying and renew-

ing auto insurance, driven by legal expenses, inflation, vehicle theft, natural disasters and tariffs.

Under the adjusted rate cap, insurers will not be able to raise average rates by more than five per cent and all average drivers will see their auto insurance premiums capped at 10 per cent at renewal. The updated approach replaces the previous Good Driver Rate Cap and extends savings to more Albertans.

"Our priority is ensuring the

care-first system provides notable savings. We will continue to closely monitor the system's implementation to ensure good Albertan drivers benefit from lower insurance costs."

Independent analysis supports expected savings with the new system. A report by Oliver Wyman indicates that auto insurance premiums will be lower on average,

once the new system is in place. Under Care-First, drivers with basic insurance coverage are expected to save an average of \$366 per vehicle.

Alberta's government is committed to ensuring Care-First delivers real savings for drivers. If the expected savings do not materialize under the new system, the government will not hesitate to take further action

to protect drivers. This includes making additional adjustments to the rate cap and exploring other policies to ensure Albertans see savings.


The Care-First auto insurance system focuses on faster access to care and recovery following collisions, rather than costly, drawn-out court battles. Alberta's current auto insurance system relies heavily on litigation,

driving up legal and administrative costs that are passed on to drivers. By reducing costs, the Care-First model is expected to lower premiums while improving stability for drivers. If an Albertan is injured in a crash, their first call should be to a doctor, not a lawyer.

The model also ensures accountability for insurers. The Automobile Insurance Rate

Board will continue monitoring insurer rating programs and profitability to ensure premiums remain stable during the transition.

Care-first and the adjusted rate cap will put Alberta drivers first.

RODEO SEASON RIDES AGAIN

Alberta's government is supporting rural communities as they saddle up for rodeo season.

Each year, more than 100 rodeos take place in communities of all sizes across the province, drawing hundreds of spectators to fairgrounds, arenas and exhibitions. From multi-day stampedes and professional competitions to youth events and international rodeos, these events fill hotels and campgrounds, support small businesses and create opportunities for visitors to experience Alberta's western hospitality.

Alberta's government continues to invest in agri-tourism through supports for agriculture societies and stampede associations to host, grow and promote rodeos across the province. Through Travel Alberta, more than \$1.3 million has been invested between 2023 and 2026, to help rural communities host and promote rodeos, expand regional tourism opportunities and attract more visitors to rural Alber-

ta. Often led and powered by dedicated volunteers, rodeos remain a cornerstone of Alberta's culture and a growing force in Alberta's tourism sector.

PARKLAND RCMP RESPOND TO FATAL MOTOR VEHICLE COLLISION

On May 4, 2026, around 11:04 a.m., Parkland RCMP responded to a fatal motor vehicle collision between a Southbound semi-truck and a Northbound pickup truck near Township Road 524 and Highway 770. Both vehicles subsequently caught fire.

The 62-year-old male driver of the semi-truck was able to exit his vehicle, was assessed at scene and transported to hospital.

As the investigation continued, it was confirmed that the pickup truck had a sole occupant, who was pronounced deceased at the scene. Parkland RCMP extend their condolences

to the family and friends of the deceased.

An RCMP collision analyst from Parkland RCMP attended the scene, and RCMP's Real Time Operations Centre in Edmonton was engaged. Police would like to thank Stony Plain Fire & Parkland Fire for responding to the collision, while Parkland County Enforcement Services

and LEDCOR assisted with traffic detours.

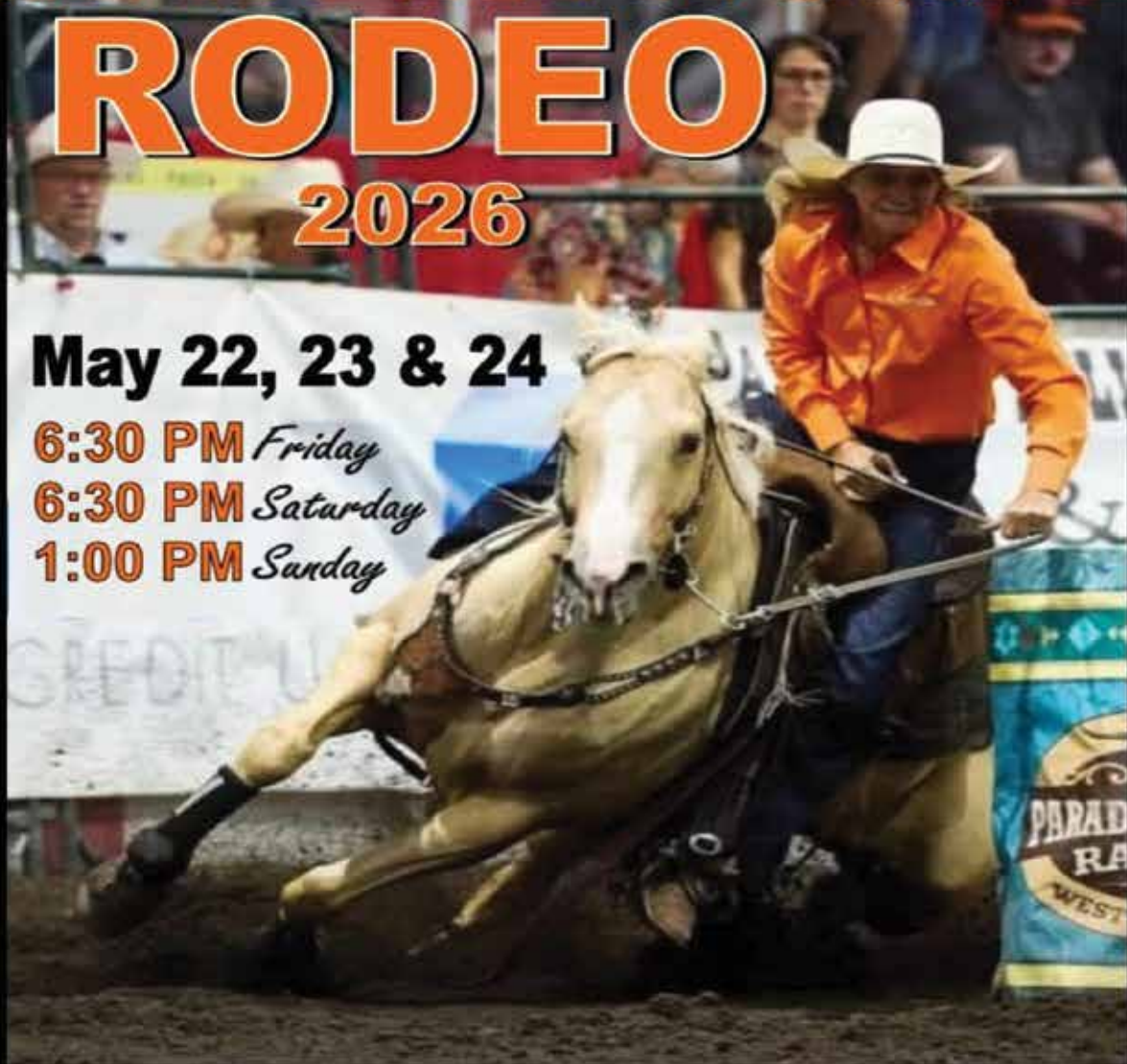

PARKLAND RCMP ARREST AND CHARGE SUSPECTS IN KIDNAPPING

On April 14, 2026, Parkland RCMP received a report that on the evening of April 13, 2026, two individuals were kidnapped, extorted, robbed and assaulted.

The victims were restrained and held against their will at a residence on

Paul First Nation, where they were beaten, threatened, and robbed by three suspects. Two of the suspects were armed with firearms, which were discharged during the incident.

Parkland RCMP General Investigation Section (GIS) took carriage of the investigation and executed a search warrant at the scene,

seizing several pieces of evidence. Arrest warrants were obtained for three individuals: a 20-year-old female, 27-year-old male, and a 33-year-old male who were all believed to be armed and dangerous.

On April 19, 2026, the female suspect was located in Edmonton and arrested by Edmonton Police Ser-

vice. The female has been remanded into custody.

On April 22, 2026, the 33-year-old male suspect was located by members of the RCMP Community Response Team and Central Alberta District Crime Reduction Unit in south Edmonton. Parkland RCMP GIS, Drugs and Crime Reduction Unit Teams deployed to the area and with the assistance of RCMP Air Services and the Edmonton Police Service Tactical Team. The suspect was arrested safely without further incident, remanded in custody and evidence was located at two separate residences including drugs, a firearm and ammunition.

On April 23, 2026, Parkland RCMP members arrested the remaining male suspect at a Spruce Grove restaurant after receiving a complaint that a male patron was refusing to pay for his meal and drinks. He was also remanded in custody.

As investigation continues, RCMP are not releasing the suspects' names at this time. The suspects are facing several serious charges including kidnapping, extortion, robbery with a firearm, assault causing bodily harm and other weapons offences.

"These violent occurrences often require a coordinated response", said Sgt. Collin Kuca, Commander of Parkland RCMP Plain Clothes Unit. "I am pleased to say that multiple units of the RCMP and the Edmonton Police Service worked seamlessly to apprehend these suspects who posed a serious risk to public safety."

COMMON-SENSE SPEED LIMITS

Submitted by Government of Alberta

Alberta's government is testing a higher speed limit, raising it to 120 kilometres per hour on a select portion of Highway 2.

In a recent survey, almost 70 per cent of respondents agreed that Alberta's government should increase the speed limits

on rural divided highways to 120 km/h. That's why, starting today, the speed limit will increase from 110 to 120 km/h, south of Leduc along a section of Highway 2.

Working alongside law enforcement, we will closely monitor driver behaviour and collect safety assessments during this pilot.

"Albertans told us they support 120 km/h speed limits on rural divided highways. Albertans want traffic safety rules that improve the driving experience in our beautiful province."

Alberta is also making our roads safer by crack-

ing down on dangerous driving. Fines for serious offences like careless driving, excessive speeding, stunting and racing have increased by 50 per cent, with most other traffic penalties rising by 30 per cent, ensuring those who put others at risk face real consequences.

"Leduc County is supportive of the Alberta government's decision to increase the speed limit on Highway 2. The province made significant improvements to the acceleration and deceleration lanes on two overpasses through Leduc County and the County of Wetaskiwin. We appreciate the work completed and look forward to the data that will come from this trial."

Alberta's highway network is best in class, and we will continue to invest in our road network, so it stays safe for drivers. Safety upgrades have been made along this section, including improvements to the interchanges, paving to improve the road surface in select areas and installing additional barriers. Signs informing drivers of the start and end points and 120 km/h signs have also been installed.

Alberta's government reminds motorists to drive to the condition of the road. When roads are wet, icy, or when there is reduced visibility, motorists must slow down. Speed limits are set for ideal conditions.

Albertans can call, text or chat online with 211 Alberta community navigators and get connected to mental health and addiction supports, as well as community and social services, any time and anywhere in the province. Individuals who are feeling overwhelmed or need help right away are connected to immediate, confidential support.

Previously, people faced navigating multiple phone numbers and entry points to access mental health and addiction services. This created confu-

sion, duplication and challenges navigating the system – particularly for those reaching out during difficult or stressful moments.

For many Albertans, mental health and addiction challenges are closely connected to housing, income, employment and family needs. Effective recovery means helping people access all of these supports together, in a coordinated way.

UAH, STOLLERY ED INTRODUCES NEW SAFETY POLICIES

The University of Alberta Hospital (UAH) and Stollery Children's Hospital are introducing new safety measures to prioritize the safety of patients, staff and visitors in their emergency departments (ED).

All patients and visitors will now be limited to one bag per person prior to entry into the ED. The UAH/Stollery Protective Services team will have methods in place to secure extra bags if required.

Reducing the number of

bags in the ED will help staff and physicians maintain a safe work environment by keeping spaces clear of tripping hazards, and ensuring chair and table space is available for patients and their support people. Exceptions will be made for those who require additional bags for medical devices or supplies, or childcare items.

Additionally, all patients seeking care at the UAH ED may be accompanied by only one visitor or support person. Limiting visitors or support people to one at a time, per ED patient, will help reduce noise

and provide more room for those who need to be there. Exceptions may be made for patients requiring additional support as determined by the care team.

Visitor restrictions will not apply to patients and families in the Stollery ED. More than one parent or guardian, and/or siblings, will continue to be able to accompany patients in the Stollery ED.

Patients or caregivers who have questions about the one-bag- or one-visitor-per-patient policy can reach out to Patient Relations online or at 1-855-550-2555. Other care

options are also available, including HealthLink, urgent care centres and family physicians.

Alberta Health Services provides acute care services for more than five million Albertans at hospitals, urgent care centres and health centres across the province. Our mission is to provide excellent and accessible patient-focused healthcare for all Albertans. Our current focus is on reducing emergency department wait times, increasing access to surgeries and improving patient flow.

WILDFIRE NEAR BEAU RAND ESTATES CONTAINED

Submitted by Parkland County

Parkland County Fire Services has contained the wildfire near Beau Rand Estates, and there is no further danger to the public. Crews will continue to monitor the area and extinguish hot spots as needed.

The fire was first reported shortly after 11 a.m. on Sunday, May 3rd. Thanks to advance planning, pre-positioned resources and a quick response, the fire was contained with no reported injuries and no loss of structures.

With conditions indicating high fire potential heading into the weekend, including elevated winds and fire weather indices, Fire Services proactively placed a

helicopter on standby and had wildfire crews at the ready. Once dispatched, the helicopter was on scene within 30 minutes, conducting water drops to slow the spread of the fire while ground crews focused on protecting nearby homes and fighting the fire directly. Additional containment efforts included creating a fire guard and support from air tankers.

Parkland County would like to thank our fire crews and support staff, mutual aid partners from Stony Plain and Devon, provincial support from Alberta Wildfire, and the teams from Fire and Flood, Delta Aviation and Alexander Forest Services. The coordinated response was instrumental to the fire's quick contain-

ment.

Although wildfire season has just begun in the County, crews have already responded to nearly 30 fires since the start of the year that had the potential to become serious very quickly, especially during dry and windy periods like the ones we are currently experiencing.

Acting Fire Chief Robert Malchow said fire bans and restrictions are based on careful monitoring of local conditions and the resources available to respond.

"Parkland County has a large, diverse landscape and conditions may vary widely depending on where you are. When Parkland County puts fire restrictions or bans in place, those decisions are not made lightly.

We closely monitor local conditions, fire behaviour, the fire weather index, and the availability of local, regional and provincial emergency resources to inform those decisions.

Wildfires escalate quickly and draw resources from across the region. When that happens, it can affect our ability to respond to other emergencies in the County or to assist neighbouring municipalities.

Help our fire crews by doing your part; please respect the fire ban, have an emergency plan in place, and book a FireSmart home assessment. Prevention is one of the most important tools we have to help keep our communities safe."

ALBERTA RCMP GIVES MOTORCYCLE SAFETY REMINDERS

Motorcycle season has arrived, and the Alberta RCMP is providing safety reminders to riders and other motorists. By being aware of each other, following traffic laws and practicing safe driving behaviours, everyone can stay safe on the roads.

Last year, in Alberta RCMP jurisdiction, there were 288 reported collisions involving motorcycles. As a result of these collisions, there were 259 injuries and 16 fatalities.

Help stay safe this riding season by following the below tips:

- Complete a pre-

ride check. Take time before getting on your bike to check fluids, tires, lights/signals, chains and the overall condition of the motorcycle. Refer to Alberta Transportation's Rider Guide for a checklist.

- Gear up. Riders and passengers must wear helmets that meet safety requirements and state the date of manufacture. A proper coat, pants, boots that cover the ankles, gloves and shatter-proof eyewear can reduce the risk of injury in the event of a collision. Avoid buying used helmets as they could have defects.

- Be bright and in sight. Stay in sight of larg-

er vehicles and avoid blind spots. Wear a high visibility jacket and helmet, in colours such as orange, yellow or white to be noticeable on the road.

- Maintain a safe following distance. Stay clear of loose gravel or rocks thrown by other vehicles on roadways and be cautious as excess debris and sand may affect tire traction and overall handling.

- Avoid speeding and weaving. Speeding in and out of traffic on a motorcycle is illegal and dangerous. Safe handling, and sharing the road responsibly, reduces the risk of collision.

- Don't show off.

Just because your bike can do it, doesn't mean your bike should do it. Slow down on unfamiliar roadways and don't feel pressure to keep up with more experienced riders.

"We can all work together for a safe riding season," says Sgt. Darrin Turnbull, Alberta RCMP Traffic. "Last May saw 45 motorcycle collisions, making up approximately 16% of the total for last year. Look out for each other on the roads. If you're in a vehicle, make sure to complete a full check before changing lanes to ensure motorcycles and smaller vehicles aren't in your path."
