Citizen Initiative Petition Verification Completed, Results Announced

As a result of a judicial decision on June 29, 2026, Elections Alberta has conducted the verification and determination process for the "A Referendum Relating to Alberta Independence" citizen initiative petition. As required under section 10 of the Citizen Initiative Act in force on May 1, 2026, Alberta's Chief Electoral Officer Gordon McClure has determined the requirements of section 6 have been met and the petition is successful.

Total number of signatures required for a successful petition (10% of 1,777,315 votes cast in the 2023 Provincial General Election) 177,732

Estimated number of electors in the province

(registered electors as of May 2025) 2,966,192

Initial signature count 286,593

Total number of valid signatures counted

(as described in Citizen Initiative Act s.6(4)) 279,337

Total number of verified signatures after random statistical sampling method applied with a 95% confidence level

(Citizen Initiative Act s.6(4)) 222,597

Estimated percentage of electors in the province who signed the signature sheets (verified signatures) 7.5%

The most frequent reasons signatures were rejected during the validation phase included incomplete addresses, electors not completing their declaration that they are an eligible elector, canvassers signing their witness declarations before electors signed the petition, and electors providing a mailing address instead of the required physical residential address. 292 duplicate signatures were also rejected. Signing a petition more than once is a breach of s.4(2) of the Act.

The primary reasons signatures were rejected during the verification phase included information provided by the elector during verification not matching the signature sheet, and electors being unable or unwilling to verify the information on the petition sheet.

On May 1, 2026, the Chief Electoral Officer directed that the Citizen Initiative petition verification process be amended to include determining if any of the seeded names from the Republican Party of Alberta's List of Electors are contained in any incoming petition. If any of the seeded names are included, fur-

ther scrutiny of the petition will result.

As part of the verification process, Elections Alberta screened the petition and has confirmed

that none of the signatures submitted came from the seeded names on the Republican Party of Alberta's List of Electors.

GUILTY PLEAS REACHED IN ILLEGAL HUNTING INVESTIGATION

Eight people have pleaded guilty to 13 offences under Alberta's Wildlife Act, following an investigation into illegal cougar and Canada lynx hunts across the province.

The convictions resulted in \$135,500 in fines and a combined

18.5 years of hunting prohibitions and related court orders.

Most of the offences involved illegal hunts of cougars and Canada lynx across Alberta. Common offences included hunting cougars after the season had closed, possessing illegally harvested wildlife, using prohibited electronic calling devices during hunts and hunting without valid

licences.

In January 2024, fish and wildlife officers began investigating an illegal closed-season cougar hunt involving Byron Stewart, owner of Tracks N Trails Outfitting in Drayton Valley. Investigators confirmed that a resident hunter, guided by Tracks N Trails Outfitting, had killed a male cougar after the season had closed.

As the investigation progressed, officers uncovered evidence of 11 illegal guided hunts across Alberta, including eight involving non-resident hunters and three involving Alberta residents. Search warrants executed in Alberta and British Columbia resulted in the seizure of 11 cougar skins and skulls, along with five Canada lynx skins.

Following the investigation by Alberta Fish and Wildlife Enforcement Services, Alberta residents Byron Stewart, Cindy Stewart and Devin Hyde of Drayton Valley; Jody Janzer of

Kitscoty; Luke Viravec of DeBolt; and Garrett Patton of Worsley pleaded guilty to a variety of offences. Two non-residents, Joshua Owens of New Braunfels, Texas, and Arnold Compton of Excello, Missouri, also pleaded guilty.

Illegal hunting undermines wildlife conservation and management efforts in Alberta. It can contribute to overharvesting, negatively affect wildlife populations and reduce hunting opportunities for law-abiding hunters through quotas and shorter hunting seasons.

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HOW TO STAY OUT OF THE EMERGENCY DEPARTMENT THIS SUMMER

Note: Alberta Health Services has an emergency department physician available in Calgary and Edmonton to speak to media on this topic. Please reach out to the media relations team to schedule an interview.

While many people look forward to a slower pace during the summer months, emergency departments often see the opposite.

Warmer weather brings more outdoor activities, sports, travel and time on the water, all of which can contribute to an increase in injuries and illnesses that send thousands of people to Alberta emergency departments each summer.

Alberta Health Services (AHS) reviewed the most common injuries that our healthcare teams see at some emergency departments (ED) in Calgary, Edmonton, Red Deer, Lethbridge, Medicine Hat, Grande Prairie and Fort McMurray. Between June 1 and Aug. 31, 2025, more than

33,000 ED visits were recorded at 13 AHS EDs for the six most common injury categories. On average, that represents more than 350 visits per day. These categories often include common summer-related injuries such as:

- Arm, wrist and hand injuries, often related to sports, cycling, playground activities and falls – 8,781

- Leg, ankle and foot injuries, including sprains, fractures and other injuries from outdoor recreation and physical activity – 8,562

- Cuts, lacerations and puncture wounds that occur during yard work, home improvement projects, camping and recreational activities – 6,130

- Head injuries resulting from falls, collisions and recreational incidents – 4,717

- Major trauma injuries associated with higher-impact incidents such as vehicle collisions, cycling crashes and other serious accidents – 3,463

- Allergic reactions particular-

ly from insect stings, bites and outdoor environmental exposures – 1,511

A few simple precautions can make a big difference:

- Wear a helmet when cycling or riding an e-scooter

- Use appropriate protective equipment for sports and recreational activities

- Keep tools in good condition when completing home projects

- Supervise children closely outdoors and keep young children within arm's reach when near water

- Protect yourself from excessive sun exposure. Stay hydrated, wear sunscreen and seek shade when possible

- Stay aware of your surroundings when hiking, swimming or participating in summer activities

- Take extra precautions and make safe choices when alcohol is part of summer activities

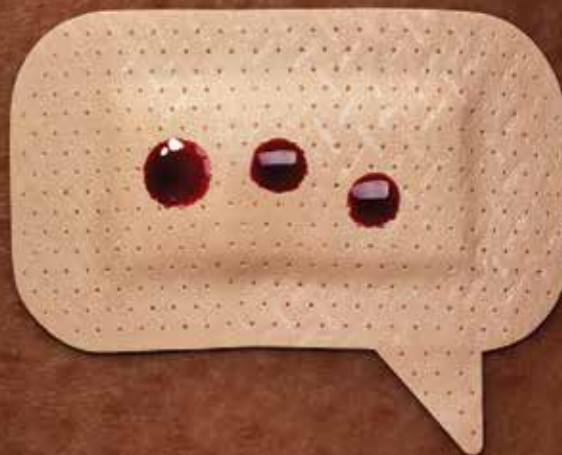
Summer safety isn't limited to injury prevention. It is also important to know when emergency care is needed. Seek immedi-

ate medical attention for serious injuries, major bleeding, chest pain, difficulty breathing, signs of stroke, loss of consciousness or any other life-threatening condition.

People with known allergies should carry prescribed medications, including epinephrine auto-injectors, if recommended by their healthcare provider, and seek immediate medical attention if they have trouble breathing, swelling of the face or throat, or signs of a severe allergic reaction.

Water

Meta's Sturgeon Data Centre will use a closed-loop, liquid-cooled system with dry cooling that requires no operational water use for cooling. Water use at the site will be limited to domestic uses, fire protection and equipment maintenance, with all required approvals subject to Alberta's Water Act.

Electricity

The data centre campus will be developed under Alberta's "bring your own power" approach. Rather than relying solely on Alberta's electricity grid, the project will combine grid-connected electricity with new on-site natural gas generation, helping protect grid reliability while supporting one of the largest private investments in Canadian history.

In Alberta, Meta is fully funding new generation and grid infrastructure to support the data centre, which will improve reliability across the entire Alberta grid and benefit all consumers.

By bringing their own generation, it will reduce the project's draw on Alberta's electricity grid and protect the reliability of power for Albertans. This will benefit electricity customers across the province by reducing transmission costs by up to six per cent on Albertans' utility bills.

COMPANY PENALIZED FOR A WORKPLACE FATALITY

A mining company has been penalized \$360,000 related to a workplace fatality.

Prairie Mines & Royalty ULC, as an employer, pleaded guilty on July 8 in the Leduc Court of Justice to one count under the Occupational Health and Safety (OHS) Act for failing to ensure the health and safety of

a worker. The Crown withdrew 11 other counts.

The charges stem from an incident that occurred at a mine site near Warburg on Nov. 25, 2023. A worker was removing excess water and clearing ice from piping. An ice plug dislodged from the pipe, striking the worker and causing fatal injuries.

Under a creative sentence, the court ordered the compa-

ny to pay \$360,000 to the Alberta Mine Safety Association to conduct research, develop industry best practices and a comprehensive training program for water removal operations.

The company and the Crown have up to 30 days to appeal the conviction or penalty.

Alberta's OHS laws set basic health and safety rules for workplaces across the prov-

ince. They provide guidance for employers to help them ensure their workplaces are as healthy and safe as possible while providing rights and protections for workers. Charges under OHS laws may be laid when failing to follow the rules results in a fatality or serious injury.

ALBERTA STRENGTHENS LOCAL PRIMARY CARE

New regional oversight will help close primary care gaps across Alberta and strengthen access in rural communities.

Alberta's government is creating seven primary care corridor health corporations under Primary Care Alberta. These organizations will take on the planning, reporting and co-ordination work that can pull front-line providers away from patient care. The corporations will align with Alberta's existing regional health corridors, giving every part of Alberta a dedicated organization focused on addressing local needs and ensuring primary care planning reflects the com-

munities it serves.

This new model builds on the recommendations and consultation done through the Modernizing Alberta's Primary Health Care System (MAPS) initiative, where Albertans and health care providers called for a stronger regional approach to primary care. For Albertans, especially in rural communities, this means a stronger focus on closing local care gaps and keeping more care closer to home.

"Albertans deserve a primary care system that responds to the needs of their community. This new model gives local teams clearer directions, stronger accountability and better coordination so more Albertans can connect with the

care they need."

If a patient cannot see their family physician, the primary care corridor will help securely share their information with the appropriate care provider so critical records follow them through the health system and Albertans receive coordinated, seamless care wherever they access services.

This new model will reduce the administrative load on front-line providers by handling regional planning, funding agreements, reporting and coordination. This will allow primary care networks to focus on delivering local, team-based primary health care with

physicians, dietitians, nurses, pharmacists and other health professionals.

"The most exciting part of Primary Care Alberta is the opportunity to shape the growth and evolution of primary care in this province. Making meaningful progress depends on strong collaboration, and PCA looks forward to working with the Government of Alberta, existing primary care networks, the new provincial health corporations and health system partners to ensure Albertans in both urban and rural settings have access to the care they need."

CYANOBACTERIAL (BLUE-GREEN ALGAL) BLOOM ADVISORY ISSUED FOR PIGEON LAKE

A cyanobacterial (blue-green algal) bloom and/or toxins have been identified in the waters of Pigeon Lake. Residents living near the shores of this lake, as well as visitors, are advised to take the following precautions:

- Do not swim or wade in any areas where cyanobacterial

blooms are visible.

- Avoid all contact with cyanobacterial blooms in the water and washed up on shore. Wash with clean tap water as soon as possible if contact occurs.

- Do not drink or cook with water from this lake.

- Do not eat whole fish or fish trimmings from this lake as fish may store toxins in their liver. Fish fillets contain less toxins

and are safer to eat.

- Keep pets away from the water. Do not allow pets to swim in areas where cyanobacterial blooms are visible or to contact blooms in the water or on the shore.

- Do not feed whole fish or fish trimmings from this lake to your pets.

As always, visitors and residents are reminded to never

drink or cook with untreated water directly from any body of water, including Pigeon Lake, at any time. Boiling of this water will not remove the toxins produced by cyanobacteria. An alternate source of drinking water should also be provided for pets and livestock while this advisory is active.

NEW POLL SHOWS ALBERTANS IN EVERY REGION SUPPORT STAYING IN CANADA

A new province-wide poll from Innovative Research Group, commissioned by Vote to Stay, found that a strong majority of Albertans in every region support Alberta remaining in Canada.

The online survey of 2,000 eligible Alberta voters is tied for the largest publicly released poll on Alberta's constitutional future and is the only publicly released poll to provide detailed regional results for Calgary, Edmonton, Central, Northern and Southern

Alberta.

While the results show majority support for staying in Canada across the province, Vote to Stay Founder Monte Solberg said Albertans cannot afford to be complacent ahead of the Oct. 19 referendum.

"These results are encouraging, but they are not the final result," said Solberg. "The separatist movement is motivated, and Albertans who want to keep our province strong within a united Canada need to be just as committed to voting. We continue to encourage anyone interested in protecting our province

and country to visit VotetoStay.ca, pledge their support, and most importantly, vote on Oct. 19."

Regional results show majority support for staying in Canada across Alberta:

- Calgary: 78% stay | 18% leave
- Edmonton: 80% stay | 17% leave
- Central: 66% stay | 29% leave
- Northern: 66% stay | 26% leave
- Southern: 72% stay | 21% leave

Note: Totals may not equal 100% because undecided/won't vote respondents are not shown

and percentages are rounded to the nearest whole number.

The survey of 2,000 eligible Alberta voters was conducted June 4-12, 2026, using Leger, Lucid, and INNOVATIVE's Canada 20/20 research panels. Results were weighted to reflect Alberta's population by age, gender, education, race, region, and past vote. As with all online panel surveys, a traditional margin of error does not apply.

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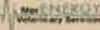
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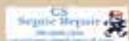

SCHOLARSHIP AND BURSARY APPLICATIONS OPEN AUG. 4

More than \$107 million in scholarships, awards and bursaries are open for application starting Aug. 4 through Alberta Student Aid.

Students can access more than \$107 million in scholarship, award and bursary funding for the 2026-27 school year. This non-repayable funding will help students pursue post-secondary education while graduating with less debt. Targeted supports such as the New Beginnings Bursary help low-income learners access high-demand post-sec-

ondary programs. In 2026-27, bursary funding has expanded from 1,000 students to support 2,400 students.

Scholarships, awards and bursaries help reduce financial barriers, recognize student achievement and ensure more Albertans can access the education and training they need to succeed. These supports help learners build in-demand skills while strengthening Alberta's workforce and economy."

COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS

Submitted by Yellowhead County

Committee Bylaw Amendment

Council gave third reading to Bylaw 06.26, which amends Committee Bylaw 10.24, clarifies authority under the Soil Conversion, Weed Control, and Agricultural Pests acts; establishes the Subdivision Development Appeal Board (SDAB) as the appeal body for matters related to the Weed Control and Agricultural Pests acts; and aligns committee structures with provincial legislation.

Grizzly Bear Concerns

Council approved a draft resolution for presentation at the next Zone 3 district meeting for endorsement and vetting before it is forwarded to RMA. In addition, a letter will be sent to the Minister of Environment and Protected Areas, the Minister of Forestry and Parks, the local MPs, and the MLA regarding Council's concerns about grizzly bear management and its impact on public safety and livestock protection in Yellowhead County.

Hinton Health Care Funding Request

Council directed administration to forward the Hinton Health Care Foundation funding request to the 2027 budget

deliberations, including additional information on how the funding would be used for recruitment and retention initiatives.

Alberta Day Event

Yellowhead County will host an Alberta Day event in Wildwood on September 1st, supported by a provincial \$5000 grant for community events celebrating Alberta Day. In future years, Yellowhead County will consider other locations to increase opportunities for residents to attend and take part in Alberta Day events that celebrate the Alberta Act, which officially made Alberta a province on September 1, 1905.

Multiplex Sponsorship

Council supported the revised YCE Multiplex naming sponsorship valuations, updates to the sponsorship catalogue, and continued active market engagement to identify a potential sponsor. Initial market feedback indicates that the cost valuations are above market tolerance, particularly for a rural and regional facility, and that a revised valuation may result in greater interest in securing a successful naming sponsorship for the YCE Multiplex.

Marlboro Hall

Council directed Administration and Council representa-

tives to engage with representatives from the community group that manages the Marlboro Hall to obtain their input on the merits of a kitchen renovation that would accommodate future building expansion. The input will be brought back to a future Council meeting.

Property Purchase

Council approved the purchase of Lot 3 and 4, Plan 9620320 in Wildwood from Alberta Infrastructure and approve the unbudgeted expense of \$99,000 from Restricted Surplus Fund Reserve – Land.

Culvert Replacement Right-of-Way Acquisition

Council accepted the BF71241 Culvert Replacement Project (IN025-053) update as information and directed Administration to defer construction until the required right-of-way is acquired. The culvert is 65 years old and has been identified for replacement; however, current construction plans cannot proceed without the right-of-way acquisition.

Shoulder Pull and Gravel Tender

Council awarded the 2026 Shoulder Pull and Gravel Program to McLeod Valley Sand and Gravel in the amount of \$1,062,668.00 (GST excluded). The contract consists of reshaping and gravelling ap-

proximately 37 kilometres of gravel roads and is intended to re-establish the side slope and crown of roads that have deteriorated over time. Three tenders were received, and the contract was awarded to the lowest bidder.

YCE Multiplex Naming Rights

Council directed Administration to proceed with preparing a Naming Rights Agreement for the YCE Multiplex Main Lobby, as discussed.

Road Encroachment onto Private Land

Council directed Administration to re-align the subdivision road and associated utilities along Lot 17, Block 1, Plan 822 0331 in Seabolt Estates with the registered road allowance, and further directed that Council for Yellowhead County approve an unbudgeted expenditure of \$700,000 for the re-alignment, to be taken from the Infrastructure, Roads and Bridges Reserve.

Node 9

Council directed Administration to distribute the request for proposals for the competitive bidding for the sale of 500 acres of land within the Node 9 lands, as amended.
