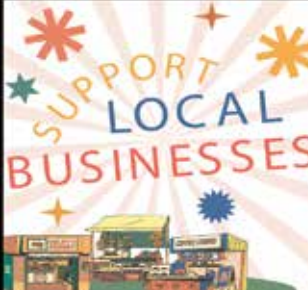
sound of a boat engine running, but no other communication heard.

Poirier, Lundgren and Berthelette were brought before a justice of the peace. Lundgren and Berthelette were released on conditions, with Lundgren set to

appear at the Alberta Court of Justice in Whitecourt on Sept. 8, 2026, and Berthelette to appear before the same court on Aug. 25, 2026. Poirier was remanded into custody and is to appear before the same court on Sept. 8, 2026.

"We understand that property crime and drug trafficking were major concerns brought up during out community consultations" said S/Sgt. Clarke, Detachment Commander of the Whitecourt RCMP. "This is why these priorities have become a part of the Detachment's current Community Priorities Plan. We are hard at work locating, investigating and arresting those who would commit these crimes in our community".

use planning perspective, it was felt that the amendments would create a pocket zoning with the potential for compatibility issues and there are other locations in the community that

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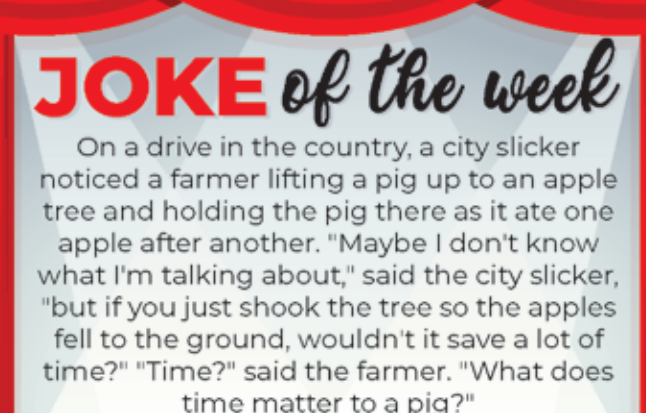

CROP INSPECTIONS FOR CLUBROOT OF CANOLA UNDERWAY!

Lac Ste. Anne County performs an annual inspection of all canola fields throughout the region, per Policy 02-010-003 Control of Clubroot Disease. This is done to monitor the pathogen's movement and reduce the spread throughout the County. In order to help producers make their own informed cropping decisions and reduce their risks, the County offers a map that shows where clubroot has been identified in canola. A copy of this map is available for viewing on our website.

Field staff take all necessary bio-security precautions when entering a field for inspection including wearing disposable gloves and boot covers and sanitizing equipment between fields.

HARVEST SEASON MEANS MORE EQUIPMENT ON COUNTY ROADS

As harvest season ramps up across the region, drivers can expect to see more tractors, combines, grain trucks, and other agricultural equipment sharing local roads and highways. This is one of the busiest times of year for our farming community, with producers working long hours to bring crops in safely and efficiently before fall weather arrives. While these vehicles play a vital role in bringing in this year's crops, they often travel at slower speeds and require extra space to operate safely.

Motorists are encouraged to stay alert and reduce speed when approaching farm equipment, and be patient when travelling behind these slow-moving vehicles. Farm machinery is often much wider than a standard vehicle and may need extra room to navigate intersections, bridges, curves, and approaches to fields. Drivers should only pass when it is legal and safe to do so and should be especially cautious on hills, curves, and rural roadways where visibility may be limited.

Farm operators also play an important role in roadway safety. Ensuring equipment is properly equipped with lighting, reflective markings, and slow-moving vehicle signs helps improve visibility for other road users. Farmers are encouraged to use escort vehicles when appropriate, signal turns well in advance, and remain mindful of traffic when moving equipment between fields.

By working together and showing patience, courtesy, and sharing the road responsibly, both motorists and farmers can help prevent collisions and ensure everyone reaches their destination safely during this busy harvest season.

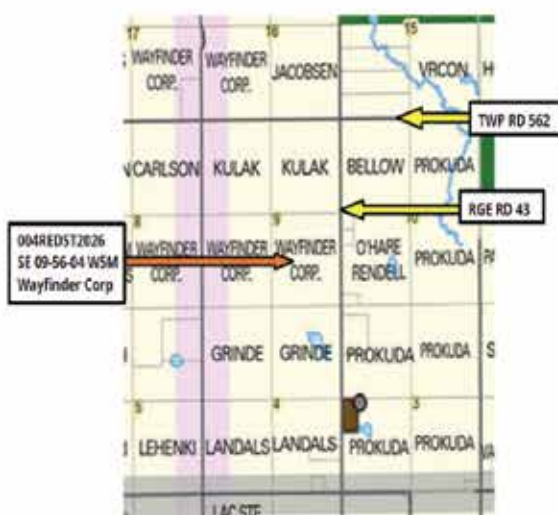

PREPARING YOUR FIREPLACE OR STOVE FOR THE SEASON

Fireplaces and wood-burning stoves not only can be beautiful focal points within a home, but they also provide an additional source of heat and can be used to keep rooms or entire homes comfort-

able without the need for additional and potentially costly heating sources.

Just like more modern home heating systems, stoves and fireplaces need to be maintained, and that maintenance includes readying them before winter when they are used more heavily. Ensuring a fireplace or stove is in good working order helps to guarantee efficiency of use and safety during the winter months.

Open-flame heating sources carry with them certain risks. The National Fire Protection Association states that, between 2009-

2013, American fire departments responded to 56,000 home structure fires that involved heating equipment. The NFPA notes that the leading factor contributing to home-heating fires is a failure to keep things clean, principally from solid-fueled heating equipment. The following are a handful of ways to stay safe as you get ready for another cozy season around the fire.

Start with the chimney. Begin by having your chimney thoroughly cleaned and inspected. Creosote can build up

inside of the chimney. Creosote is highly flammable and becomes more difficult and expensive to clean the longer it builds up inside your flue lining. In addition, animals may have created nest inside of the chimney since the last time the fireplace was used. A professional chimney sweep should be hired in this situation. He or she will be able to effectively clean the chimney in a manner that is the least messy and disruptive to residents.

• Install or check smoke and carbon monoxide detectors. Operation-

al alarms are essential to preventing injury or death resulting from smoke or carbon monoxide inhalation. Such detectors are inexpensive safeguards that should be installed on every floor of the house. Batteries should be replaced every six months, and the alarms themselves should be changed every five to 10 years.

• Inspect the chimney from outdoors as well. Inspect the mortar around any bricks in the chimney and surrounding areas for cracks. If left unaddressed, these can cause dangerous fires. If there are serious

cracks, a professional may need to make repairs or the chimney may need to be replaced. You also can have the chimney capped with a screen to keep animals and debris from entering.

• Inspect the damper. A damper is a valve or plate that stops or regulates the flow of air inside a chimney. It should be checked prior to the first use of a stove or fireplace so homeowners can be certain it opens and closes smoothly.

• Clear out flammable items. Move flammable items away from the front of a fireplace or stove.

Be sure curtains or other home furnishings are far enough away that they will not catch fire from any errant sparks or flames.

• Order wood now. Be sure there is plenty of wood for the season. Ask a wood supplier to estimate just how much will be needed, and double-check that the wood will arrive in time for the start of the season.

By preparing for fireplace and wood stove use now, homeowners can ensure their winters are comfortable and safe.

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REDUCE COLD-WEATHER FIRE RISK

Plenty of things heat up when the temperature drops, including the risk for fire hazards. Fireplaces, stoves, heating systems, candles, and even electric lights are used more often during the winter than any other time of year, so it makes sense that the risk of home fires increases when the mercury drops.

The U.S. Fire Administration says 905 people die in winter home fires each year. Cooking is

the leading cause of all home fires and contributes to around \$2 billion in property loss each year. Understanding potential risks and exercising caution can help homeowners protect themselves, their families and their homes from fire.

Cooking
Home heating fires peak between the hours of 6 p.m. and 8 p.m., when many people are home preparing dinner. The following

steps, courtesy of the American Red Cross, can improve safety in the kitchen and reduce the likelihood of a home fire.

- Never leave cooking food unattended, as it can take just seconds for fires to ignite.
- Keep anything that can catch fire away from the stove or other appliances that generate heat.
- Clean regularly to prevent grease build-

up.

- Make sure appliances are turned off before leaving the room or going to bed.

Heating
The National Fire Protection Association warns that heating is the second leading cause of home fires, deaths and injuries in the United States. The NFPA offers these safety guidelines.

- Install heating appliances according

to manufacturers' instructions or have a professional do the installation.

- Fuel-burning equipment needs to vent to the outside.

- Never use an oven to heat a home.

- Keep anything that can burn away from heating equipment, including portable space heaters.

- Clean and inspect heating appliances regularly.

- Turn off portable heaters when leaving the room or going to bed.

Electric

The National Safety Council estimates that between 600 and 1,000 people die each year from electrocution. Electricity also can contribute to home fires. The Energy Education Council offers these safety suggestions.

- Never force plugs into outlets.

- Check that cords are not frayed or cracked. Do not run cords under carpets or place them in high-traffic areas.

- Use extension cords only on a temporary basis.

- Make sure light bulbs are the proper

wattage for fixtures.

- Install ground fault circuit interrupters in kitchens, baths, laundry rooms, and elsewhere, making sure to

test them regularly.

- Check periodically for loose wall receptacles and loose wires. Listen for popping or sizzling sounds

behind walls.

Home fires are no joke and can be prevented with simple safety checks.

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ELECTIONS ALBERTA ADDRESSES VOTER REGISTRATION MISINFORMATION

Over the past few days, there has been a significant volume of social media misinformation relating to voter registrations and Elections Alberta's online Voterlink tool.

"Elections Alberta is monitoring several streams of misinformation that have been increasing as we get closer to the referendum on October 19. Misinformation about voter registrations is the latest social media rumour being promoted in

an effort to cause concerns related to the referendum," said Chief Electoral Officer Gordon McClure. "Elections Alberta would like to reassure Albertans their information in Voterlink is safe and secure, and that contrary to reports, no voter registrations have been removed from the List of Electors without electors' consent. If you have voted in previous provincial elections, and have not moved or changed your name, you are likely registered to vote."

More information to assist voters with their registra-

tion is below.

Albertans should expect misinformation and disinformation campaigns to increase leading up to the referendum. Elections Alberta has run several awareness campaigns to assist voters in identifying misinformation and disinformation. These attempts often undermine facts about the use of technology, the voting process, and the integrity and ethics of election staff. In some cases, misinformation can also discourage or intimidate people from participating in elections.

This is a reminder that emotionally charged and sensational messages on social media should be viewed with caution and voters should check Elections Alberta's website and other credible sources for facts before believing or reposting these messages. 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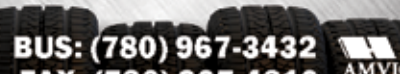



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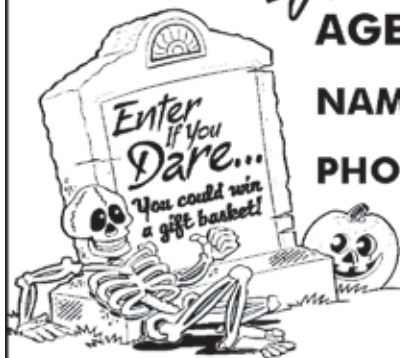
